



Welcome to ParEvo

ParEvo is a method of exploring alternative futures or histories, using a participatory evolutionary process (hence ParEvo). The process is designed to be used by multiple people, to produce a branching structure of storylines about what did, or could, happen. Participants are anonymous and can choose the extent to which they collaborate with others. Participants are also able to tag, comment on, and evaluate the storylines that are generated. Completed exercises can be analysed using downloaded data describing the content of storylines and the structure of people's participation. Outcomes can be both cognitive (e.g. how we think about the future) and behavioural (e.g. how we respond to the future).

The use of ParEvo is free, subject to approval by the Administrator.

How it works - in brief



- The Facilitator provides the seed for a story. This will usually be no more than two or three paragraphs long, setting the scene for what might happen next. It is like the first first page of a novel.
- Participants are then asked to each add a short text describing what happens next. These are the nodes 1-10 in the diagram, representing contributions by 10 participants in the first "iteration"
- 3. Participants then read all these contributions and each select one they would most like to




ParEvo process design

= participatory evolution of future scenarios or past histories

Nodes = short text description of events Branches = storylines = sequences of events Tree = storylines built up iteratively, in parallel Columns = successive iterations, moving right

Evolutionary algorithm =

- Variation Participants each add a new text, in each iteration
- Selection Each participant can only add one new text to any one existing storyline, per iteration
- Retention/reproduction only surviving storylines can be added to





These are the results from the evaluation nound, How many people thought this storyline fell into each category is shown below:

Least Desirable: 3	Most Desirable: 0
Least Likely: 1	MustLikely: 1

11 Not only was Trump facing multiple lawsuits, but so were a great number of his administration. At this point, Vice President Hamis began to take a more prominent role, often appearing on news programs to speak for the administration and explain the initiatives she was personally leading. President Biden said during his campaign that he thought of himself as a bridge to the future, and it seemed he truly felt this way. Hamis was clearly being positioned, by Biden and the DNC, to assume the role of POTUS in 2024 or 2028. The public increasingly saw her as a seasoned, intelligent, warm figure, not unlike Obama. Trump never stopped campaigning during his term in office and the democrats learned from this. They started Hamis' campaign very early indeed, though they were less blatant about it.


ParEvo outputs

- Multiple storylines describing alternative futures
 - Surviving (11) approx. 1,350 words length
 - Extinct (20) 200 to 1,200 words
- Evaluations of those storylines, by participants and others
 - Predefined criteria: e.g. Likelihood & Desirability, etc
 - Participant defined features
 - Available via
 - Downloadable data sets
 - Online survey providers
 - Group and one-to-one meetings

Objectives of a ParEvo exercise

- Cognitive changes:
 - More flexible and self-aware thinking about the future aka "Futures Literacy"
- Behavioural changes:
 - Greater capacity to anticipate and respond to uncertain futures
- Meta
 - Accumulated knowledge, via multiple ParEvo exercises, of how to deliver these changes

Plotting storylines on multiple criteria

- Likelihood x desirability
- Equity x Sustainability
- ?

Asking questions

- 1. What storylines are contested and why e.g.80
- 2. How to respond to different combinations of likelihood and desirability...

Storyline types & possible responses

Storylines are	Undesirable	Desirable
Likely	Prevent beforehand, mitigate afterwards	Compare and harmonise with pre-existing plans
Unlikely	Monitor possible changes in their status	Enable beforehand, exploit afterwards
